New AGCO Training Center Opens at Parkland College

Parkland College opened its new AGCO Training Center in December.

Located between the Parkhill Applied Technology
Center (ATC) and the Tony Noel Agricultural
Technology Applications Center on the campus's west
side, the \$6 million facility is the site for Parkland's
new AGCO Service Technician associate's degree
program, designed to help meet the demand for skilled
technicians who can service AGCO's popular Fendt® and
Massey Ferguson® brands of agricultural equipment.

Local AGCO dealers
work in partnership
with Parkland College to
conduct training activities
at the new facility and at
dealerships. Students in
the program, sponsored
by AGCO dealers, take

advantage of a work-based learning model that rotates between classwork and fieldwork.


Parkland's Board of Trustees approved the bid from Petry-Kuhne Co. of Champaign to construct the center in

2023. The new facility contains three classrooms, faculty offices, and 18,000 square feet of equipment laboratory space. Construction on the AGCO center was supported by a \$5 million donation from AGCO Corporation.

Parkland President Dr. Pamela Lau said the new facility will offer students training in high-demand careers, promising a solid foundation for continued employment and advancement in the agricultural equipment industry.

"Parkland College is recognized as a leader among peers

in precision agriculture education and a responsive organization to the needs of our local and regional employers," she said. "We are excited for this new facility thanks to the generous gift from AGCO





New Transfer Partnerships with SIUC, Millikin

Parkland College has entered new transfer partnerships with Southern Illinois University Carbondale and Millikin University.

In October 2024, Parkland President Pamela Lau and SIU Chancellor Austin A. Lane signed an agreement for the Saluki Step Ahead program, enabling students who graduate with an associate's degree from partnering community colleges to complete their SIU bachelor's degrees online at a lower cost.

"Parkland welcomes its new partnership with SIU through the Saluki Step Ahead agreement," Lau said. "For many years, university partnerships have provided Parkland students with ever-broadening opportunities for seamless credit transfer and the attainment of baccalaureate and other advanced degrees."

Parkland students who have completed an associate degree with a cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 will be automatically accepted into a Millikin baccalaureate program and provided with a plan of study to complete their degree in two years.

"Through this seamless transfer process, Millikin is recognizing the quality of the faculty and courses offered at Parkland," said Nancy Sutton, Parkland's vice president for academic services. "We are confident our graduates have acquired the knowledge and demonstrated their commitment to education."

Students Participate in Semiconductor Training

When researching the stock market, Parkland College student Jeslie Mounka found an article about the recent CHIPS Act for semiconductor manufacturing, which piqued her interest. Soon after, her physics professor, Robert Chamberlain, mentioned an opportunity in semiconductor training at University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

"I was so excited to learn more because I wanted to get hands-on experience on how semiconductor development worked," Mounka said. "Once I got into it, all I needed to do was follow directions to ensure we made a clean semiconductor."

Mounka was one of eight Parkland students in this program, which included one week in a Parkland classroom learning the importance of

semiconductors, the manufacturing process, safe cleanroom practices, and the industry job market. Students then spent another two weeks at the Grainger College of Engineering at UIUC.

Lights! Camera! Action! Parkland Expands Film Industry

Parkland College has partnered with Rantoul-based Flyover Film Studios and with Shatterglass Films and The Line Film Co. of Champaign to expand the pipeline of professionals in central Illinois entering the film industry.

Students pursuing the college's Entertainment
Technology AAS degree now have an option to work
as an intern with film and TV production professionals
at these companies. Such opportunities enhance the
real-world, hands-on experience the program currently
provides, according to Parkland College Theatre
Director Brian Morgan.

"Our new partnership brings a new layer of marketability for the area's entertainment-industry trainees," Morgan said.

Operating from the former Chanute Air Force Base in Rantoul and backed by a \$1.1 million grant from the

Illinois Soundstage Capital Grant Program, Flyover Film Studios is currently building state-of-the-art sound stages and production facilities from the site, with the aim of creating a central Illinois hub for the country's film and television production industry.

The new program option provides foundational skills in wood and metal custom fabrication, lighting and sound technologies, management principles, basic automation operation and design, and industrial safety. Graduates of the AAS degree can work as union stagehands or in a commercial technology vendor company before pursuing other careers in the entertainment industry.

"We were taught the basics of film construction, along with the dos and don'ts of the industry," said Drew Bagby, a student who participated in the program at Flyover. "I felt very confident with the instruction I was given and could work comfortably in a film setting."

Parkland College Hosts Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence

Dr. Youssoupha Mane brought West African perspectives to instruction in the humanities, social sciences, and fine arts at Parkland College this year.

An educator and researcher at Assane Seck University in Ziguinchor, Senegal, Mane specializes in African Studies and the traditional art of the peoples of West Africa, particularly Senegal.

Parkland's first Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence in many years, Mane taught History and African Studies and collaborated with the Giertz Gallery and the Spurlock Museum of World Cultures in Urbana.

"I am grateful to be a Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence at Parkland, which has deepened my empathy for international students and enhanced my appreciation for the value of diversity," Mane said. "I believe this has broadened my awareness of cultural differences and understanding. Being

at Parkland as a Fulbright Scholar is a privilege, where I find a tranquil environment and warm, welcoming people, particularly my hosts. Parkland reflects the essence of Champaign."

Mane is one of 43 Fulbright Scholars-in-Residence for the 2024–25 academic year.

Professor Sees Impact, Gives Back

For Dr. Yoon Pak, supporting the academic success she witnessed at Parkland College was an easy decision.

Pak, head of Education Policy, Organization and Leadership at the University of Illinois' College of Education, and her family recently established the Pak-Walch Endowed Scholarship Fund at Parkland. The gift will help students in the college's Humanities, Fine and Applied Arts, STEM, and Health Professions programs.

"We always knew the value of community colleges, especially for students who may be at a place where, financially or socially, they're just not ready for a big university," Pak said. "We always held that value really close."

Pak discovered the Parkland Pathway program through colleagues and students at UIUC, intrigued after hearing many of the program's benefits.

"The reputation is that Parkland is a hidden gem and really one of the best [community colleges] in the nation in so many ways," Pak said, "and that was solidified when my oldest child, Hana, was able to become a Pathway student too." The family's appreciation for Parkland's course instruction and

the program's university life preparation made the difference for Pak, her husband, Matthew Walch, and Hana. They wanted to give back.

"There's that immediate financial need students have, and while to us it may not seem like a big amount, it probably is significant to them," Pak said. "We want to help them get over that hurdle so they can focus on their studies."
